We recently received the sad news that longtime member from Aberdeen, Carol Zephier, passed away on the morning of Saturday, August 27th. Carol was a dedicated and enthusiastic member of SDMTA and will be missed.

One other sobering piece of news arrived in August, which was MTNA's elimination of all voice, strings, woodwinds, and brass competition categories beginning in 2013. They felt that the financial drain caused by these competitions could no longer justify keeping these relatively small categories open any longer. There remain now just the piano, chamber music, and composition competitions. This ruling seems likely to prove somewhat of a blow to our state's membership participation in competitions, if it were not for the fact that all of SDMTA's competition categories are still being offered. If all of the students who had planned on entering MTNA competitions switched over to SDMTA, then the level of competition will be just as high. Although our competitions stop at the state level, we have much to offer our vocal and instrumental students in terms of competitive experience and educational value. With luck, our vocal and instrumental entrants will burst the seams of the competition schedule in 2013

As for this year, the board of directors and conference committee has been working hard over the summer organizing this fall's annual conference, November 3-5 at the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. As an SDMTA member, this is *your* conference, and we hope every teacher out there will make an effort to attend, and here's why: our superb guest artist recital featuring double award winning pianist Adam Golka; a full day of professional development (improving your teaching) workshops; competitions for your students; the fun of spending time meeting your teacher colleagues from around the state; and last, it's dirt cheap. You spend more taking your family to the movies than on our registration fee. So carve out that first weekend of November for SDMTA, and join us for our Vermillion conference. See you there.

2011 SDMTA Conference in Vermillion

Preparations are being made for the Fifty-Seventh Annual SDMTA State Conference in Vermillion November 3-5, 2011. A busy schedule of competitions, concerts, master classes, and workshops will fill the three days. Our guest artists include Adam Golka who will play a recital on Friday evening and conduct a master class on Thursday. Adam has been a frequent guest in Sioux Falls where he has played on the Dakota Sky Concert Series and with the South Dakota Symphony Orchestra. On Thursday evening we will be treated to a vocal recital by our guest voice clinician, Dr. Robert Grayson of Louisiana State University. We are especially excited about the opening of the newly-remodeled Slagle Auditorium and hearing the restored Ernst M. Skinner pipe organ. This 32 stop organ was originally built in 1925 for the new Slagle Auditorium.

Workshops include presentations by Eugenio Zapata of Yankton, USD faculty members Larry Schou, Tracelyn Gesteland and Susanne Skyrm, John Walker of SDSU and Marcela Faflak of NSU, and Dr. Arthur Johnston Associate Professor of Piano at Lakeland College and Drea Wagner, New Song Piano Studio, Sheboygan, WI. These workshops will take place on Professional Development Friday. We will also have a guided tour of the National Music Museum with particular emphasis on the keyboards, by Professor John Koster. There are important new additions to the keyboard gallery that have been made in the last year, and we will look forward to seeing and hearing more about them. Our Independent Music Teachers Forum luncheon will feature a presentation by Eileen Geske about composition and lunch at the National Music Museum.

For those who would like to arrive in Vermillion early, there will be a special re-dedication recital of the Skinner organ in Slagle Hall on Wednesday evening. David Higgs, Chair of the Organ Department at the Eastman School of Music, will perform the recital. Mr. Higgs has performed concerts throughout the world and has premiered many new works for the organ. He has served as

an adjudicator for prominent organ competitions, and has performed at many national and regional organists conventions. Phil and Marge Odeen and Tom and Cindy Lillibridge donated funds to renovate this organ, which includes finishing the fourth keyboard, providing stops intended but not provided in 1925. The renovation also included installation of new wiring allowing greater flexibility for the organist to change sounds or stops

The re-dedication of the Skinner pipe organ in Slagle Auditorium will take place on Wednesday, November 2, 2011 at 7:30pm. It is free and open to the public, and SDMTA members are welcome to attend.

Make plans now to attend the Conference in Vermillion and enjoy three days of music, information, reconnecting with friends from all over the state and making new ones.

Local musicians to attend Music Teachers state conference

Ms. Melody Maker of Busyville, South Dakota and three of her piano students will attend the 57th annual state conference of the South Dakota Music Teachers Association, held at the University of South Dakota in Vermillion, November 3-5. Concerts, workshops and student competitions are the featured activities of the annual fall event. Special guests for this year's conference include internationally-renowned young pianist Adam Golka and singer and pedagogue, Dr. Robert Grayson of Louisiana State University. Additional state and regional performers, clinicians and adjudicators will be featured.

The South Dakota Music Teachers Association (SDMTA) was founded in 1955 to serve the needs of studio teachers teaching music to individuals or small groups of students. The organization is an affiliate of Music Teachers National Association (MTNA), a group which now has a membership of 24,000 music professionals in fifty states and the District of Columbia. SDMTA is further supported through five local associations in Aberdeen, the Black Hills, Brookings, Huron and Sioux Falls.

Three of Ms. Maker's students will participate in the Elementary and Junior piano competitions on Saturday, November 5. Performers are Furious Fingers, age 11, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Parent Fingers, Powerful Chords, age 13, son of Ms. Solid Chords, and Gentle Soul, age 12, daughter of Ms. Good Woman and Mr. Helpful Soul. Each student will perform two memorized pieces and receive written comments from the competition adjudicators. Last year, two of Ms Maker's students placed/performed in the SDMTA state competitions.

Ms. Maker has owned and taught at Top Notch Music Studios since 1992 and is a member of the Local Area Music Teachers Association. She has a bachelor's degree in music from Best University and serves as pianist for the Busyville Community Choir. Ms. Maker completed her music teachers certification through MTNA and her state certification through SDMTA in 1994. She teaches solo and group piano lessons with additional classes in music theory, music history and music performance. Ms. Maker's students perform in the annual City Christmas concert, Top Notch Studio annual recitals and in SDMTA and Piano Teachers Guild festivals and competitions. GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

November 5th, 2010

Special Guest: Dr. Gary Ingle

Secretary's Report, Danie Crowley: Minutes from the last General Membership Meeting were reviewed. The minutes were approved with the correct spelling of the word software.

Treasurer's Report, Cheryl Koch: Because of the growing competition numbers over the last couple of years, SDMTA has brought in more money than it has spent. So, the treasury is in very good shape. As of June 30th 2010, the total amount in the treasury is \$26, 524.55. The J. Earl Lee fund has a C.D. with \$10,922.31. There is \$500 in the J. Earl Lee checking account to send Division winners to National.

<u>Budget:</u> A new budget was approved for 2010. The budget had been increased from \$4,500 to \$6,000 for guest artists' and judges' fees in September. Also, a category was added for archives. The Center for Western Studies at Augustana has agreed to house our archives. The material in the archives still belongs to SDMTA. Members will be allowed to use it at any time. If any non-member wishes to research our files they will need permission from either Cheryl Koch or Donna Schwartz. To do this, we have to be members of the Center for Western Studies. We are allowed to be an individual member for \$50 a year. However, a recommendation was approved to give \$75 for the next few years. The Treasurer's Report and Budget Report was approved.

Presidents Message: John Walker is happy to be SDMTA's new President. He has no plans for any big changes. He is interested in attracting new members, of course. He also wants to attract members into positions with smaller jobs rather than larger overwhelming jobs.

Local Association Reports:

<u>Aberdeen, Kay Fischer:</u> Aberdeen has 18 members. Some members are retiring, but there are new members, as well. They meet once a month in a church. After the conference, on December 15th, students are going to play Christmas music at the mall all day long. Tuba Christmas will also be playing that day. Marcela Faflak will be conducting a master class all day, January 29th, for middle and high school students.

Black Hills Area, rep. by Rita Hicks: Because of the large area covered, they meet twice a year with many other informal meetings throughout the year. In February, there is a Piano Extravaganza at the mall with 10 Clavinovas for duets. In April, there is a piano festival.

Sioux Falls has the hospitality room for divisional this year. The all boy recital is in February. The piano festival is in March. Guild Auditions will be held, as well.

We had been working on raising the J. Earl Lee funds principle to \$10,000 with fundraising. Once that cap was reached, all fundraising was done to raise money for the Foundation Fellow. Also, a committee should be appointed that determines how we use the money. The motion was passed.

Competition Chair Report, Marilyn: The numbers are down a bit from what they were last year. There have been about 5 scratches so far. There has not been a special needs contestant. There are 5 or 6 duets. This year we are printing the winner certificates out and so far it is going ok.

Certification Report: Marie Schlosser was married last Saturday and is moving to Arizona. She is also having problems with her eyesight. Therefore, she will no longer be teaching or serving as our certification chair. Her position is now open for someone to fill. The Certification Board had its own checking account with about \$500 to pay \$100 to anyone who wanted to seek National Certification. Since no one has used that, *Cheryl made a proposal that we fold the money into our general state operating budget, but save it for certification activities. The motion was passed.*
